Burton Home Bureau, Home Extension, HCE 1917- 2018

Burton Unit HCE was one of the Charter Units of Adams County Home Bureau, which is now HCE. They started in 1917 and some of the original members were Mrs. Golden Sims, Mrs. Harriet Sims, Mrs. Ada Oitker, Mrs. Isma Tandy, and Mrs. Frances Viehl. They often talked about going to the meetings with horse and buggy. And when the horses were in the field, they walked. They were willing to sacrifice to be able to take part in the fellowship and learning experiences found at the meetings. At one time our unit had around 30 members. We are now down to 7 members and 3 honorary members, having lost 4 members this year.

A few years ago the Plainville Day Unit joined our unit and just last year the Plainville Nite Unit also joined us. We welcomed them all.

Many of our members have been officers of the Adams County HCE board. One of our members, Bonnie Tenhouse also served as 2nd Vice President of the State HEA Board.

We have sponsored the Burton Flyers 4-H Club for many years. We furnish refreshments for their Organizational Meeting and help advise when needed.

The highlight of our year is always our summer trips. We have gone to Pere Marquette State park, Blue Rose, Carthage Jail, Nauvoo Temple, Hummingbird Farm at Astoria, Round House at Nauvoo, The Burton Museum and Doll House Museum in Quincy. We've also gone to the Dancing Rabbits Compound, had dinner at an Amish home, went shopping at Colony and Rutledge in Missouri, took many trips to Bed and Breakfasts and much more.

Although we are small, we still participate in many of the programs offered by HCE. We take lessons and attend the Cultural Enrichment lessons, and we participate in the Book Club and Card Club.

We have contributed to the Dress An Angel, Salvation Army Christmas, Food Pantries, 4-H Trophy at the Fair, Make it and Take It and Kiddie Bazaar.

Liberty Unit History 1942-2018

Liberty Unit of HCE has been an active unit since 1942. Charter members included members who transferred from more distant units as well as new members. Members' children enjoyed Adams County Extension Advisor, Miss Walbridge's treasury of toys as their mothers enjoyed lessons presented by Miss. Walbridge. "Old timers" told about selling baked goods, garden produce, chickens, eggs, noodles, and other things on Saturday mornings at the Home Bureau Exchange in Quincy.

Membership has included ministers' wives, new mothers, new brides, teachers, 4-H leaders and 50 year members. Old records show that there have been several 2nd and 3rd generations of families and members. In the mid 1980's Hazel Akers became the first generation of her three-generation family to become members of the Liberty Unit.

Through the '70s membership was consistently over twenty and homes were stretched to have meetings. In 1975 and 1976 Liberty held Quilt Shows. Members made quilts to sell at these shows. They dressed in old time dress. Coffee and tea were served from silver tea pots. Cookies were delicate and fancy and, of course, homemade. Quilts shown were from brand new to very old as well as from far away distances because many viewers brought their own quilts to display.

Members from Liberty Unit have filled various positions on the Adams County HEA/HCE board, including President. Individually, members have chaired Annual Meeting committee, District meeting committee, Kiddie Bazaar co-chair, and District Kiddie Bazaar chairman. As a unit, Liberty made elephant ears and decorations for the HCE Week Party in 1995. During HCE Week in 1996 the Liberty Unity Hosted a Tea Party. Also in 1996 Liberty Unit planned and carried out decorations and favors for the Annual Meeting. They have participated in many other HCE activities. In 1995 and again in 1997 Liberty was the Honor Unit for South District.

Funds for charitable donations to various organizations and individuals as well as the many craft projects have been raised in various ways over the years. Participation in the 1986 and 1977 Christmas Show is very memorable. Members made Raggedy Ann and Andy Dolls to sell. Two members dressed as Raggedy Ann and Andy. In 1983 Liberty sold Elephant Ears at the Liberty Fall Festival. They have had many bake sales, quilt shows and white elephant auctions at Unit meetings.

Annually the unit has club Tours in June, Family Picnics in July and a Family Soup Supper in January or February (whenever weather permits). Tours have been to places such as historical sites in Springfield, Nauvoo, Hannibal, Rutledge, craft shows, museums, The Villa Katherine and various other locations in Quincy.

Often Liberty Unit members have carry-in meals for Craft Days. Classes are taught by members and others recruited from the community. Often food or other things are worked into meeting agendas from Special Feature lessons. These have included such things as noodle making, baking bread, rolls, and Danish pastry. Many an angel has been crafted from wood, string, Paper Mache and various other materials. Dolls have been made from buttons, with soft bodies, and also from soda cans. Sweatshirts have been painted, appliqued, decorated with thread stitches, material gridded on the wrong side and the skirt then cut into holes. Other craft projects have been fake fur flowers, material flowers, door hangings, reworked lawn chairs and much more. Occasionally things are thrown out and we start over, but most often we wear or display our projects with pride and go on to make many more similar items. Sometimes it seems as though we're always eating. All in all, Liberty Unit meetings and craft days are informative, interesting, and always enjoyable!

As of September 2016, Beverly/Liberty units combined, merging together as a combined unit, due to low membership.



January 2018 – 11 active members still enjoying craft and monthly meetings at members' homes. For the past several years we have been busy with the Kiddie Bazaar (the first Saturday of December), caroling and snacks for Timber Point nursing home, collecting toiletries for Illinois Veteran Home, family potluck and of course, enjoying dessert at each member's home, as well as learning together with monthly lessons.
