#### Community Outreach CAROLYN FISHER

January 15, 2009 ~ this is the postmark deadline for the President's Awards applications. Community Outreach has four sub-categories: Citizenship, Environment, Safety, and Special Activity. You received the information

in your 2008 IAHCE District Workshop packet. Please report any outreach activities you may have done in your county. If you network with another group, you may also report on that project. Should your activity/project fit better into another category: Cultural Enrichment, Family Issues, International, Membership (Second Vice President), or Public Relations, please sent the President's Award application to the proper Director

Environmental concerns: Every year we hear about energy conservation and then another gadget that uses electricity comes to the marketplace. The automobile industry is promising to make more gas energy efficient cars and then on October 30th three automotive manufacturers announced the cancellation of their plans to make their promised hybrid vehicle – they needed to cut production to hold down prices. For now the Great Lakes are protected from having their water diverted (as the resort lake in Georgia that was close to being drained this year to send water to Florida). Do what you can to be part of the solution rather than be part of the problem.

Don't forget about the NVON Project in Common: MAD – Making a difference working with foster children. What you are able to do in your county is up to your own discretion and imagination; we received no guidelines for this project. We will have a new Project in Common for 2010–2011.

Project Linus Update: Some counties have had success with their local Project Linus chapters, others have not. We are not connected to Project Linus. You may send your blankets to wherever you feel they are needed. The specifications set forth by Project Linus are standard and acceptable to any group.

Some WalMart stores have greatly reduced their sewing and craft area, some still have a bigger area. Seam rippers were no longer available in some stores. I have noticed them reappearing in Wisconsin WalMart stores. Local grocery stores have some "convenience" sewing supplies, but I have yet to find a seam ripper among them. Maybe a write-in (e-mail) campaign is needed.

Last year I received requests from only 8–10 counties – so it's time to voice your lesson topics.

During this fall, when you selected your lessons for next year, instead of sending your requests to campus – Rose Sisco – this year you were to share that information with your county director. As part of the program planning process, the county director will secure the educators for your future programs. This change occurred with the Educational Programming Proposal.

One key factor that was omitted from the Educational Programming Proposal is Extension Educators as of October 1, 2008 have to raise \$5,200 of program fees. These funds are being used to off-set travel funds that have been reduced from the educator. Many questions came up during the August district meetings asking why were educators now charging for programs and why was there a minimum number for participation.

We all know about limited resources and due to the economic times, University of Illinois Extension is also feeling that situation even more.

During the fall meetings, I highlighted the characteristics to be a good member and how to recruit new members. Remember there are 2.9 millions Illinoisans who are baby boomers that are entering retirement. Some of the 2.9 million are currently IAHCE members. But many of this group has been busy – with their families, childrearing and working out side the home. Jo Davies County HCE Family Issues Director emphasized FAMILY DAY in her program beginning in 2007. The Annual National Family Day is the fourth Monday in September, which is a special day to eat dinner together as a family, which would be the evening meal in most families. Jeanette Podnar put the materials together, contacted banks, etc. for awards and thus the "Eating With Your Family" contest began, with the third graders in each school in the county. The students were asked to write a paragraph or two telling what they liked about their family sitting down and eating a healthy meal together and why it was important to them.

In January 2008, our HCE board helped judge the essays and awards were given in February/March. A winner was selected from each school. Top prize was a \$50 savings bond given to eleven winners.
