


#### INTERNATIONAL RITA STEWART



#### UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS EXTENSION FIELD LIAISON REPRESENTATIVE Susan Taylor

Greetings to IAHCE members from the University of Illinois Extension. I want to commend the increase by counties in participating and recording the volunteer hours of members of CVUs. This year, 310,358 hours were submitted @ \$19.51 = \$6.055.084.50.

In 2008, 48 counties out of 87 counties participated. There were 11 new counties who participated. 842 members out of almost 11,000 members participated in CVU Program. 368 Members were new participants. Keep volunteering and keep up the good work. Your efforts help your communities and counties.

I shared your Volunteer information with Extension Administration and they were very impressed.

When I met with the State IAHCE board after the conference, I shared two items with them. As you work on a committee, the work is better when you use the committee members. Like a 3-legged stool, if you only have one leg-it's hard to balance everything and committee members strengthen the work. I asked them individually – to write down items that could strengthen committee work. Then I had them pair up – the two individuals added to their lists. Finally, I had a group of four add to their list. The last grouping had the strongest list of how a committee could function. A few of the items were:

Communication
Do your part
Contribute ideas, time and effort
Follow meeting procedure
Plan - vs doing - strategies
Be prepared for meetings
Understand who is responsible
Follow your committee's objectives and purpose
Make the committee operate efficiently

Like the three legged stool, think of a Three leaf clover – One – leaf – as management – work of IAHCE – Concerns with performance at the level of individual, with the performance of the larger processes performances – committees, units, districts, and organization itself – One leaf as leadership – Organizations don't do anything – people do – give vision and directions in their leaders. One leaf as governance – power and authority that are exercised in an organization like IAHCE – There are rules and limits on the exercise of power.

Things will overlap -

Management and Leadership Leadership and Governance Governance and Management

The second item that I shared with them came from the State 4-H website and I adapted it to IAHCE.



#### Do You Sit on Your Hands Enough?

"Some HCE members I know sit on their hands. They are helpful, capable, and enthusiastic and love kids, but they sit on their hands. They tell me it's a habit that works very well.

One of the most difficult things a HCE leader must do is allow other people to use and develop their abilities. Whether it's a new member or a member that has been here for 20 years, the first meeting for the fund raiser, the HCE leader is often tempted to help. Sometimes he/she should sit on his/her hands.

We all know it's simpler and faster for the person who already knows how to do something to do it again. The muffins will be gently rounded instead of peaked, the meeting will be given by an experienced leader, the club business meeting will go smoother, and the booth will get a neatness award. But what happens to people in the process? Johnny doesn't remember to stop stirring. Mrs. Brown still hasn't had a meeting alone with the members. The club president decided Mr. Leader can do it better, so why bother to try. The members of the club booth committee still haven't had the experience of carrying out an idea as a group.

It's not easy to decide when help is needed and when help would stifle developing abilities in another person. Think about your last project meeting. Was there a time when you reached in to do something yourself, when a few directions to a member would have allowed him/her to do it him/herself? Did you hurry to clean up because the members take too long? There are no "right" answers. But consider it. Do you sit on your hands enough?"

"I hear --- I forget. I see -- I remember. I do -- I understand."

It takes time to develop effective committees and to involve others in IAHCE, but consider the benefits of involving others and sitting on your hands.


On Jun. 17, another trip is planned by our International

They had a much more difficult time in high school since the cities from which they came were from homes where parents expected their kids to attend college and become attorneys and doctors and professionals. I began going into the communities, locating jobs for the older students and placing them in the work setting. This turned into a full-time job as more and more students were staffed into special education in this large school district with about 8,000 youngsters.

Secondly, I was given the opportunity to work in the high school theater department as their costumer. Really the director learned I did a lot of sewing, and since he was desperate to get someone to costume FUNNY GIRLS, he took a chance on me. Bob and I hit it off, or rather my designs and sewing ability suited his requirements. We worked together on about 30 musicals, one for each March and one each summer from 1969 to 1992, Creating costumes for shows like MY FAIR LADY, DOLLY, CHORUS LINE, WEST SIDE STORY, OLIVER and many others gave me something artistically to do. (I moved north to the Chicago area with the plans to study dress design at the Art Institute.)

In 1977, my third opportunity came when I was asked if I would be interested in becoming an administrator in the district. Now talk about "opening a new window" (I never costumed MAME.) but when I said I would, it was like opening Pandora's box. So for the next 15 years I held three different positions as director/assistant principal. We closed one high school where I was called a building manager (really it was like an assistant principal) and moved staff and students and equipment and supplies into the two other existing schools, prepared for the Nazi march in the very Jewish Skokie, hosted President Carter at a political rally in our Niles East gym, ran student activities and many other duties.

#### MEET OUR NEW BOARD MEMBERS

After I became Director of Student Services, the biggest department in the district, supervising 35 certified staff and 15 clerical and security. I will not go into detail about all of those responsibilities, which I assumed for 8 years. Then the Central office decided they would create a position with responsibilities in two high schools. I now was Director of Fine Arts. For four years I supervised the art, music, theater and dance departments. As Director of Fine Arts I attended many parent meetings, went to all the performances by all the music, dance and theater departments, traveled with the groups when they went on tour and God knows what else! I retired at 55 before the Central office staff could get creative again.

After "retirement" I took a ten week trip to celebrate. This took me to all but two (North and South Carolina) states I hadn't as yet visited. When I came home in time to vote in November of "92" election, I sat around for a few days, then got a job part-time in a fabric store. While working there I got many sewing jobs starting my own business. The music department asked me to design a skirt the girls in the orchestras and chorus



could wear while performing and which would not reveal too much when they played the cello. Not only did I design an A-line skirt, but also over the next several years, I made over 400 of them. When I got bored sitting in the sewing room making garments and having only the TV as my companion, I then

managed to get a position as counselor for low income and first generation students at the local community college. I was desperate to spend more time with people like I did when in school. This was a half-time position so I then took a half-time one at my old high school as dean in charge of discipline and attendance. This was an administrative job I wanted to do from the first, but they said I had too much ability for that. (A joke!) That turned into the most difficult part-time and /or full-time job I had held! This kept me busy until it was time to sell my house and return to my place of birth in Southern Illinois.

I had bought the house my parents had built. And prior to my return I designed the floor plan for the renovation of the basement. The builder had it finished to my specification when I moved back to Perry County in June of 1997. I continued filling my days with gardening and guilting and making the skirts and substitute teaching and doing volunteer work with

4–H, HCE, bowling officer and raising funds for maintenance for the Swanwick Cemetery. I should end this before it develops into something I might try to sell to a publisher (with many changes and additions, of course). But first I should list the out of States travel I have done. The countries are: Mexico, Canada, Denmark, Holland, Sweden, England, France, Greece, Turkey, Italy, formally Yugoslavia, Bermuda and the Bahamas.







#### RECIPES FROM ARGENTINA ~ 2009 COUNTRY OF STUDY

#### **SOUPS/APPETIZERS**

#### Veal and Vegetable Stew From ALLRECIPES.com INGREDIENTS

- 2 medium onions, chopped
- 3 cloves of garlic, mashed
- 2 pounds of veal or beef
- 1 can whole peeled tomatoes (chopped up)

50 grams butter

oil- SMALL AMOUNT

- 2 carrots, cut into slices
- 1 sweet potato, cut up
- 1/2 pound of squash, cut up
- 3 potatoes, cut up
- 2 corn ears, cut up
- 1 cup of rice
- 1 can peaches or apricots salt and pepper beef broth

#### **DIRECTIONS**

- 1) Brown the onion and garlic in the oil and butter.
- 2) Cut the meat into squares and add to the pan.
- 3) Brown the meat well.
- 4) Add the tomatoes, carrots, and beef broth to cover the ingredients.
- 5) Season as desired.
- 6) Cook 15 minutes and then add the rest of the vegetables.
- 7) Cook until the vegetables are half done; then add the rice and the peaches.
- 8) Continue cooking until everything is done.
- 9) Serve sprinkled with parsley or basil.

#### **BACON WRAPS FROM ARGENTINA**

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 1 package bacon
- 1 loaf bread
- 1 can sweet condensed milk about 3 cups shredded cheddar cheese Worcestershire to taste mustard to taste toothpicks

#### **DIRECTIONS**

Cut the package of bacon in half (not lengthwise), take three slices of the cut bacon and lay them side by side. Remove the crust from a slice of bread. Place the slice of bread on top of the three slices of bacon and flatten it.

Next, mix the sweetened condensed milk with mustard and Worcestershire sauce to taste. The mixture is should be sweet and sour. Spoon the mix on top of the bread. Sprinkle a handful of shredded cheddar cheese over the milk mixture.

Roll the three pieces of bacon up and skewer three toothpicks through the rolls making three separate sections. Then cut the roll into thirds.

Repeat until all of the bacon is used up. When finished making the wraps, put them on a broiling pan and bake at 375°F degrees until bacon is cooked and brown.
