It was great to see over 400 of you from all over the state in attendance at the 2011 IAHCE Annual Conference under the Big Top. As I bring greetings from University of Illinois Extension! I want to commend you as an

organization for your CVH hours for the hours of volunteer work that you provide to your communities and counties. The value of your time is \$20.85/hour according to the Independent Sector. That is what your time is worth; unfortunately you can't cash in your hourly amount. This year 1,694 participants from 59 counties reported, over 474,252 hours were turned in which is valued over \$9,888,154.20. Your leadership to your community, county, district and state board not only benefits IAHCE but many other organizations in your communities.
