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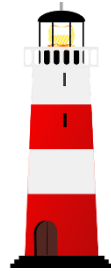

I still have some counties to visit to achieve my goal to visit all the member counties of the IAHCE. I have 14 left to visit and I have five of those on my schedule to visit in the next couple months! As much as I enjoy visiting all the counties in Illinois the highlight of the past year was the trip to Australia and the ACWW Triennial Conference! I cannot find the words to really describe that trip except maybe amazing! I was extremely proud to be representing the state of Illinois and the IAHCE at the conference. I guess I really was representing the CWC/USA too, since they were the reason I wrote and presented the resolution on iron deficiency. Gee I hope I did everyone proudly!

So, we started this change process by realigning the districts. When you leave here on Thursday you will leave most likely with a new number that you will use from then on. Hopefully you have noticed a change of focus with more focus to the positive side of membership, we emphasize more on the new members each county secured over the past year rather than the losses. We hope that we have also become more accessible to each of you, letting you know that if you need help, we are there! Fun, I hope that has been reinstated into the annual conference and into your counties. A joke now and then is okay! Laughter is good for everyone! Oh, by the way do you know why cows have hooves? The lactose's! Sorry couldn't help inserting a little humor there!

In reading over the service project reports, kudos go to Warren County. They heeded my urging last year to try some new projects. They literally marked on the project report each of the new projects they did last year! Diane wrote "new" by them and that the sheet was not big enough to list all their projects! Diane also noted the grand total of the projects they completed last year and it came to \$7,292.00. To me that really seems outstanding. I am sure that some of the other counties would have similar totals if they tallied theirs, too! Piatt County I would like more info on the "Honor of Home" display you did at the Piatt County Museum! A couple of other projects that stood out to me were from Sangamon county- the sent 700 sanitary pads to a 3rd world country and donated \$300 to purchase books for a high school English class.

I will mention a few, in my judgement, of the outstanding projects completed by the IAHCE membership over the past year. 500 pounds of tabs to Ronald McDonald house, 99 bras to “Women Support Women”, appreciation lunch for the local Extension office personnel, sponsored trophies for 4-H shows, numerous times first responders were shown appreciation, dresses and shorts were made for Africa. 2000 pounds of food donations to the food pantries, \$7200 scholarship donations and over \$6,500 worth of other monetary donations. Nursing homes, libraries, over 1700 books to schools, domestic violence, anti-ouch pouches, military appreciation, and let us not forget our Veterans you aided were just a few of the projects undertaken by the membership of IAHCE.

I cannot pass up the opportunity to express how proud and excited I was when the final tally came in for the water bottle project, we did last year. Over \$8,000 of the \$14,000 plus came from all of you. Again, you are an amazing bunch of people!

The numbers I gave should be a lot higher as I did not get any numbers or amounts on a lot of the service reports and only 37 counties reported. Imagine where the numbers for the CVH and the project reports would be if all counties participated! And, the variety of projects would probably be even greater! As we go forward, I want you to know that I will do whatever it takes to keep this organization strong, prospering, and growing but we are a team so you must help me. In this day and age what was needed years ago as far as having a successful family life, strong community service, leadership skills, and a purpose in life has not changed. Everyone still has all those needs but in order to fulfill those needs you must approach it differently today than how those needs were approached several years ago. If we don’t change, we don’t grow. If we don’t grow, we aren’t living a quote by Gail Sheehy.

Sandra Broadrick-Allen, Champaign – passed away on Sunday, March 1, 2020 in Sullivan in hospice care. She was born on May 5, 1940 in St. Charles, Mo. She married King Broadrick, associate director of the honors program at the University of Illinois, on July 4, 1975. Sandra is survived by four stepchildren, nine grandchildren and 5 great grandchildren. She received a Bachelor of Science degree in home economics. Received a master degree in guidance and counseling and Ph.D in higher education administration from the University of Illinois.

Sandra was very involved locally with IAHCE and nationally with ACWW. Sandra joined Illinois Homemakers Extension Federation (now Illinois Association for Home and Community Education (IAHCE)) in 1983. She was a member and was President of the Savoy Unit. In 1988-1990 was elected President of the Champaign County Home and Community Education. In 1993-1995 was District Director for the Illinois Association for Family and Community Education (now IAHCE). In 1997-2000 was elected President of IAHCE. In 1998-2001 was elected Vice Chairman of ACWW United Nations Committee and was a delegate for IAHCE to the 1998 22nd Triennial Conference held in Pretoria, South Africa. And 2001-2003 was elected chairman of ACWW United Nations Committee.

Sandra was campaign manager for state Rep. Helen Satterthwaite in 1982 and 1984. From 1985-991, served as the first city manager for the Village of Savoy. Served as the first woman district governor for District 6490 in 2001-2002. She helped form the Savoy Rotary Club and became their first president. Sandra traveled and circled the globe on numerous cruises for months at a time.

A memorial service will be scheduled at a late date at the McKinley Memorial Presbyterian Church.

District 1 and 2 will meet on August 11th, 2020 at the United Methodist Church at 160 Johnson Ave, Sycamore

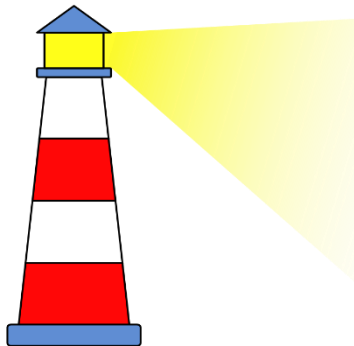
District 3 will meet August 12th, 2020 at the Southern View Chapel – 4500 S 2nd Street, Springfield

Many thanks to the board for all their hard work in making the IAHCE Annual Conference in March a HUGE success. It was so great seeing many of you and I'm thrilled that we got to "shine our light" during this uncertain time.

As you may know, Extension offices around the state are currently closed. Please stay tuned to your local office Facebook page or website for updates and information regarding office open procedures. 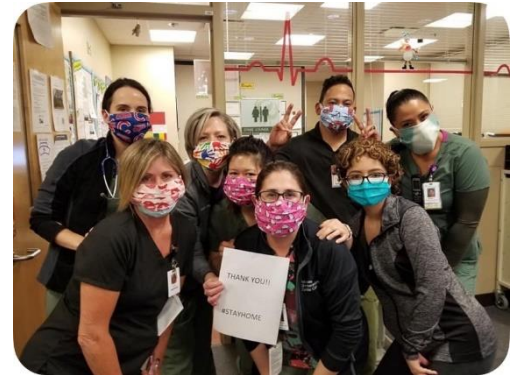

Because of the worst.

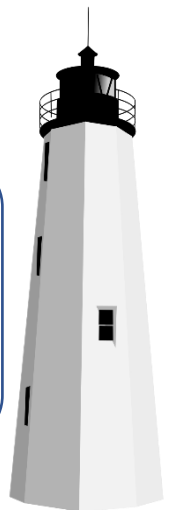

DISTRICT 3 NEWS

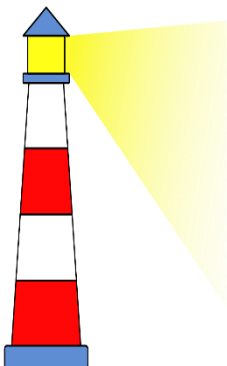

Spring has brought out the little crocus' and early flowers. The rain and clouds will pass and there will be sunshine!

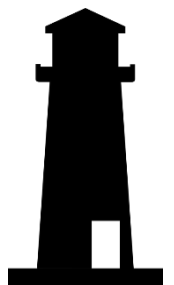

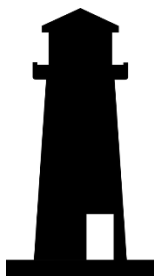

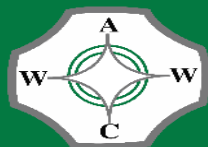
One of the most interesting parts of the conference was an inspirational message and painting provided by Becky Belcher from Hamilton

Dear friends,

I am pleased to be writing to you at this time when so many are facing worry, fear, and even panic around what feels like a situation totally out of our control. However, we must remember that remaining calm and focused on sensible precautions will help protect us all. ACWW first passed a resolution on immunisation programmes in 1980, and called for vaccination against potentially eradicable diseases as recently as 2016. Global investment in vaccine programmes would go a long way to eradicating the impact of novel viral infections. Our commitment to the World Health Organization must go beyond the verbal, and we must do our best to keep our communities strong and safe by following WHO advice on hand sanitation and social distancing as the best form of defence against Covid-19 (Coronavirus). We must also ensure those most vulnerable in our communities are cared for, and avoid hoarding or panic-buying provisions that cause undue strain on food and distribution chains. Remember that 80% of the world's food is produced by rural communities, and we must do our best to remain centred and calm in this trying time. These communities require sensible health provision all year round, and for all conditions, not just a virus outbreak benefiting from press coverage.

Sadly, with international concern regarding the spread of Covid-19, the UN Secretary General held a meeting with all UN Ambassadors at which they decided to cancel the annual Commission on the Status of Women meeting. I had intended to be representing ACWW at this meeting, joined by several Board and Committee members who had paid to attend at their own expense. It is very disappointing that this important event has been cancelled, and around 8,000 women globally have had to adjust their plans. As you might have seen, our UN Committee Chairman Marie Kenny and I were able to transfer our flights to London and we spent a very productive week with our Central Office staff producing a series of advocacy resources to ensure that the voices of rural women do not go unheard at this challenging time. These have been and will continue to be posted on our Facebook page, and our website. Please do take a look!

At the Triennial World Conference in Melbourne last year there was a lot of interest expressed in our UN work, but particularly a desire to understand how individuals and member societies could directly participate in our advocacy work. Last month we sent a letter to all member societies asking for their support for a letter to UN negotiators working on the Political Declaration for the Commission on the Status of Women. This pointed out that women's rights are human rights, and cannot be removed from important legal treaties. This letter was signed by 185 organisations in 35 countries, representing more than 11.95 million women. It was the strongest response from ACWW's network of members and supporters in many years, if not ever, and I was delighted to see so many unite behind our message. The letter was read during negotiations at the UN, and the UK negotiator was able to use this to leverage our point and ensure as strong a Declaration as possible was agreed.

For those of you who have ordered copies of the Rural Women in Action Pack, you will be pleased to know that the first orders have already been posted from Central Office. As you will read below, there will now be a delay in further dispatching packs. They look fantastic, and will be such a brilliant resource for members to raise awareness of ACWW's work, learn, share knowledge, and make personal commitments to sustainability. You are also able to download the items from the Member Resources page of our website. Please don't forget to let us know how you use them!

Upon my return to South Africa from London, I have had to enter 14 days of Self-Isolation. My husband and I drove straight from the airport to our farm out of the city, and are safe and as comfortable as possible. Sadly, because of new government advice in the UK, ACWW's Central Office will be closed from this afternoon. Our staff are doing their best to establish what work they can do from home (whilst ensuring we continue to protect the personal data of our members and comply with the law!), and we hope to have provisions in place in the next few days to make this more effective. Please bear with us, everyone is doing their best in this difficult time.

When considering your meetings, gatherings, and events such as Women Walk the World, please be aware of official advice relevant to your location and nation. Please rely on this official advice, rather than some of the nonsense being spread on social media.

I send you all my very best wishes, and my hopes for your safety, comfort, and good health. You are always welcome to contact me and Central Office (all email addresses will be checked regularly, even if there is a little delay in responses).

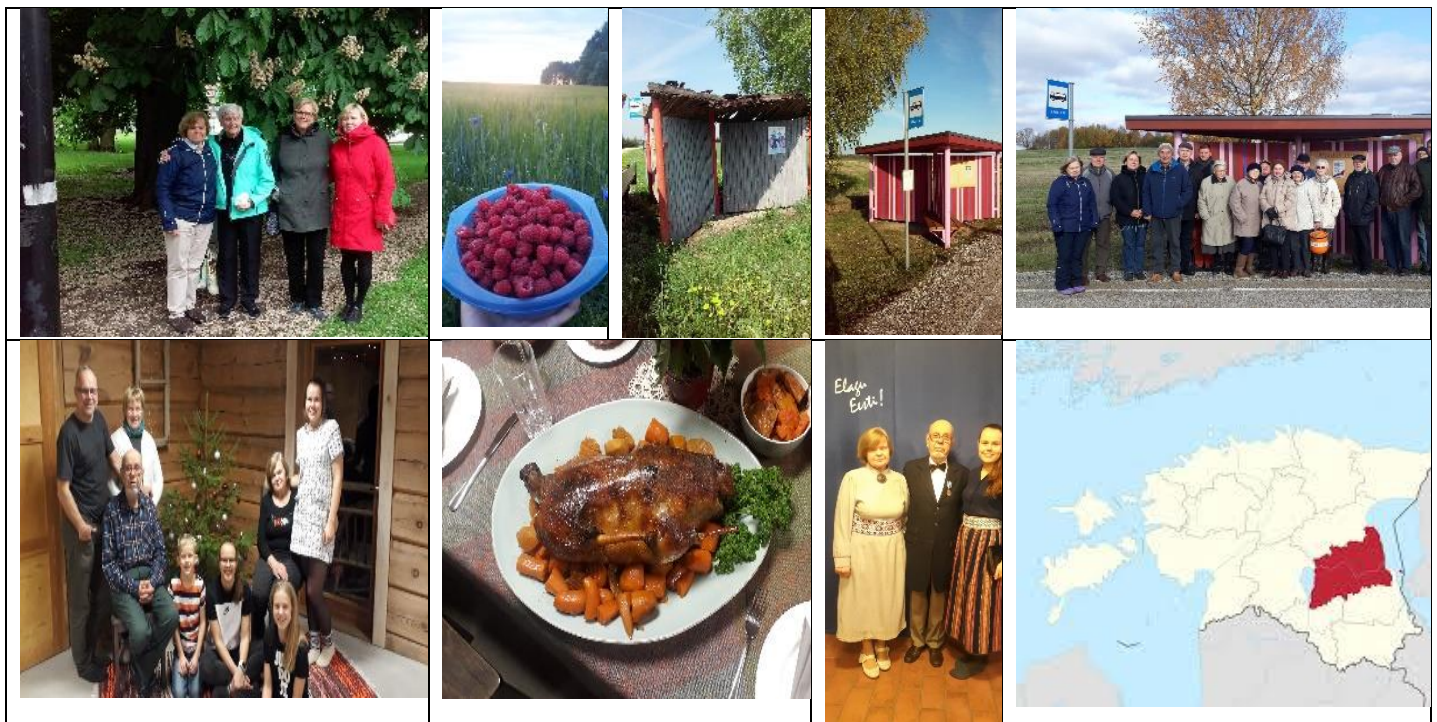

The corona virus pandemic has a too familiar effect on the lives of Estonians. Rutt says "We started to sit at home from 12th of March. Our business was indeed affected a bit by the virus, as some events are postponed or cancelled completely". Keeping up with friends and acquaintances worldwide is a pleasure for me. I have my membership in IAHCE and its affiliates including the Associated Country Women of the World to thank for that.

FAMILY AND COMMUNITY ISSUES- Eleanor Gregory, IAHCE Director

Family and Living, Safety:

Kane (District 2/3)- An HCE member and her husband were the targets of identity theft and wished to inform others of problems they face even years after the theft. Kelly Kennedy, Vice President and Operations Manager with Card Services, spoke to attending HCE members and guests about scammers such as charity fraud, health care offers, "You've Won!", tech support, IRS scams, and imposters for grandkid scams and more.

Monroe (District 6)- "Women 'Supporting' Women" appropriately describes the objective of making HCE members aware of domestic violence as they collected 99 new and like new bras for women in need and donated them to the Violence Prevention Center of Southwestern Illinois. The informative and serious nature of the speaker's presentation contrasted with the ladies "Fun Stuff"... "What Religion Is Your Bra?" and "How to Make a Bra Out of a Napkin".

Jefferson (District 7)- HCE members created and donated 158 Comfort Bears (with a label "MADE FOR YOU BY JEFFERSON COUNTY HCE) to a local ambulance service, 3 local volunteer fire departments, home for unwed mothers, facility for sexually abused children, Illinois Department of Children and Family Services AND including Illinois State Police squad cars! A grandson quote... "Even children who don't need a "Comfort Bear" understand the importance".

Health, Food, and Nutrition:

Marion (District 6)- These ladies focused on MENTAL HEALTH (Dementia, Alzheimer's, Autism, and Asperger's) by creating and distributing 173 labeled (Donated by Marion County Home Community Education) Fidget Blankets to senior care centers and schools. These ladies completed these blankets in three all day Workshop Sessions.

Jefferson (District 7)- Wanting to share their blessings, Jefferson County HCE ladies collected not only canned and boxed goods, but paper products to donate to the local Food Pantry. Monetary donations were given as well. For the holidays small hams were given along with other holiday fare. A GAME AND SOUP Night, which was open to the public, gave an opportunity to celebrate soups around the world while collecting more items for the pantry.

Citizenship, Environment:

Lake (District 2/3)- Lake County ladies recycled bottle caps to make benches for schools and are in partnership with the National Diaper Bank Network to help provide diapers and other baby items. Participating in "Dress a Girl Around the World" (A Campaign under Hope 4 Women International) gave an opportunity to coordinate a bracelet to match the dress. Ronald McDonald House benefited from 100 lobs. of pop tabs. Providing personal items such as feminine products to food pantries became another special project.

Monroe (District 6)- Early childhood and Head Start programs in East St. Louis and Columbia, Illinois benefited from the 526 children's books collected by these energetic ladies. Their premise is that all children should "own" books. "The ladies counted, organized and delivered. Flyers in the books identified HCE as donor.

Jefferson (District 7)- These ladies had great results with promoting recycling. Exchanged ink cartridges at Staples for newsletter supplies, kept trash out of landfills by collecting bottle caps and plastic lids to make school benches, and newspapers and magazines to nursing homes for their enjoyment. Other recycling events are light bulbs at Lowes, aluminum cans to VFW, medicine bottles to Ronald McDonald house, and repurposing items such as a fryer to a flowerpot!

Special Activities:

Kankakee (District 2/3)- Helping the elderly and the children describes the efforts of these ladies. They sewed and filled over 500 stockings to give to 6 different nursing homes. They made weighted blankets for Autistic children, shortened handles on 200 canvas school bags along with providing school supplies. A \$500 scholarship to Kankakee Community College, holiday food baskets for two families in need, saved manufacture coupons for military service personnel, and they still had time and energy left to make walker bags, bibs, and lap robes for nursing home patients.

Morgan (District 4)- HCE ladies held two workshops to assist the Children's Craft Activity chair of the Festival of Trees sponsored by Pathway Services, a center for adults with special needs in Jacksonville, Illinois. The HCE ladies created small inexpensive Christmas tree ornaments for the children to decorate their own little individual trees. They used recycled items such as beads, greeting cards, and many other common items to create these holiday treasurers. Their creativity is resourceful and practically endless.

Perry (District 7)- The Perry County ladies provided an awesome array of activities to promote health, food, and nutrition in unique ways. Healthwise, a speaker from Ameren told about the importance of good lighting to help prevent vision problems, and a Purple Martin expert assured everyone that these birds' chirping relieves stress and their insect eating habits prevent bites! Foodwise, a lesson on noodles and dumplings proved to be quite tasty (recipes included). Then a history of ice cream and the fun of making ice cream using Ziplock bags. Different ideas and ways to use tortillas were shared. Nutrition became the focus at the Pinckneyville Hospital Health Fair where Fee Fee the fish presented his iron deficiency facts!

GRAND AWARD: MASSAC COUNTY (District 7)

The HCE ladies know how to present NUTRIOUS SNACKS! Celebrating Youth event at Shawnee College gave an excellent opportunity to present “Nutritious Snacks” and the importance of portion size. Veterans in assisted care and nursing homes were the recipients of nutritious snacks as well as the 911 response team. An ear of corn constructed by 4-H and FFA youth used green and yellow cans (800 cans) which caught the eye of everyone at a 5-county event. (HCE supplied \$250 worth of the canned foods). The local food pantries were thankful.

INTERNATIONAL- Cara Ausmus, IAHCE Director

Country of Study- India:

Lake (District 2/3)- Held a basket auction of Indian objects and celebrated the opening of an Indian grocery store in Lake County.

Sangamon (District 4)- Worked with an Asian Women’s Society in developing a program to enhance the study of India.

Macon (District 5)- Used a culinary student group to prepare food for the International event and celebrated elephants.

Jefferson (District 7)- Held a craft day during International HCE Week. Red, White, and Blue objects of choice, rear view of Santa’s red car with “Ho, Ho, Ho” on license plate and used purple coneflowers as decorations, objects of choice.

Other Country of Study:

Perry (District 7)- Coordinated with 4-H members to celebrate another state.

International Event:

McLean (District 5)- Invited 10 friends to participate in an International Event.

Massac (District 7)- “Reaching the World by Reaching Our Neighbor First”. A program invitation using red, white, and blue signs and a red truck Christmas motif with Santa.

Multiple International experiences included food, colors, booklets, and skills along with a snake charmer.

HCE Week

Kane (District 2/3)- “Ocktoberfest” was a day of fun, games, and entertainment resulting in the building of a network system and the community learning more about HCE and its educational value.

Macon (District 5)- Educational programs ranging from Frugal Cooking and Humming Birds to Barn Quilts and tours of the area made up the HCE week activities. Over 100 were in attendance for the events. Six new members were enrolled.

Perry (District 7)- Perry County HCE events in the community touched all age groups, interest groups, and cultural groups. A unique program involved a local author at a poetry reading.

Special Activities

Stephenson (District 1)- A Electric Pressure Cooker Workshop was held to explain the convenience and time-saving points in using this appliance.

Kane (District 2/3)- A booth with HCE information, recruitment, community outreach and international projects were set up during the Kane County Fair.

Sangamon (District 4)- A Trivia Fundraiser allowed Sangamon, Menard, and Logan Counties to the annual sum agreed to be paid to the University of Illinois Extension; increased community awareness of HCE and gave a sense of unity and comradery for the membership. Honey M-M-Good was a featured educational program stressing the importance of honey bees and the production of honey. The program was presented in support of a project of ACWW making people aware of the endangerment of the bee population.

Madison (District 6)- Four different locations each with a different event provided educational and fun means of reaching potential members. A variety of media was used to advertise the events. Funds from a live auction were designated for local charities and other organizations in the community.

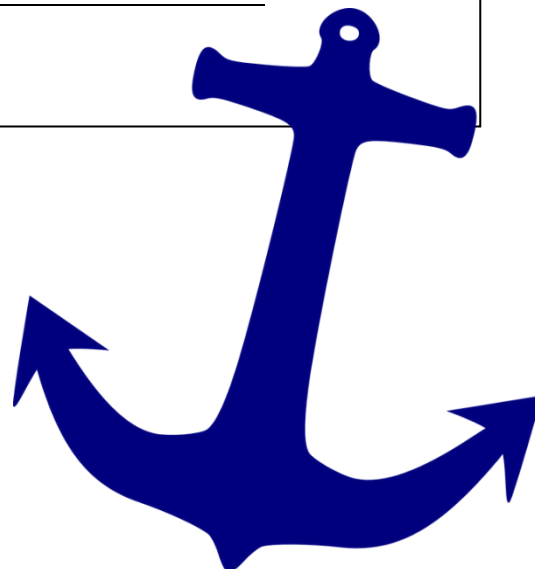

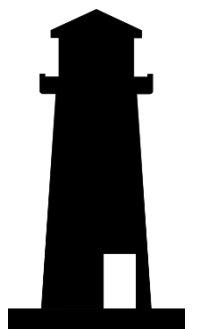
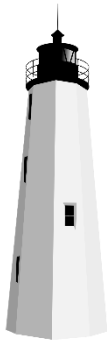
