
Jo-Daviess

From the top of Illinois, fall greetings to all!

In this column we are celebrating the life of the late Marcella Arnold, a member of Jo Daviess County HCE since 1951. She was a member of the Woodbine Unit and held offices in the Woodbine HCE unit, Jo Daviess county board, and IAHCE state boards. She was also a member of ACWW and was a delegate to the conferences in the Netherlands and Australia. She was a 4-H leader for many years and also held offices in her church.

Marcella and her husband Wayne were farmers and after Wayne's death, she and her sons continue to farm the Century Farm to this day. She was the proud mother of 4 children, 12 grandchildrend and 17 great-grandchildren. She will be missed, as she was an inspiration for everyone she met.

In other news, we held our annual Friendship Day in October, where members bought their cultural arts for display. We received very informative presentations from representatives of the Workshop, an organization who assists adults with needs and also from the Jo Daviess County Transit, a service for anyone who needs a ride for shopping, health appointments, and group outings. It was very informative. We enjoyed a lovely luncheon and comradery. Our units are busy with fundraisers with brat sales at local grocery stores and serving as runners at Culvers. Our units will also decorate a tree at the Stockton Heritage Museum for the Annual Festival of Trees and Christmas Walk. We have supported these efforts a number of years and always have a great time with decorating and conservation.









Mercer

Mercer County celebrates Home and Community Education week for 2023 with 19 visitors and members of MCHCE. Mercer County celebrated HCE Week on October 11 with a presentation provided by Lois Retherford, member of MCHCE. The Illinois Association for Home and Community Education's theme for this year was "Pearls of Wisdom". Typically, this theme refers to a saying or advice from years gone by, that was meant to teach a lesson when someone experienced one of life's challenges. Mercer County flipped the "pearls" to teach a history lesson. Lois is working with the Essley Noble Museum of Aledo, IL. To research veterans who lived in Mercer County and whose family brought them back to Mercer County to be buried in home soil. From records, Mercer County has 3669 deceased Veterans buried in one of 49 cemeteries across the county. Lois has volunteered her hours of research for each and every veteran whom she had discovered in county newspapers and museum records and through "Find a Grave" website. This research has led her to discover historical facts about veterans and the wars in which they fought. Interestingly, Mercer County has two veterans from the Revolutionary War buried in two separate cemeteries. Now we are certain that the Revolutionary War was not fought on Mercer County to make their new home and their relatives died and were buried here.

Through her research she has discovered that there are 41 veterans from the War of 1812 in Mercer County cemeteries but only five veterans from the war of 1832 with Chief Blackhawk and this war was fought in and around Mercer County. Lois's exploration then led her into the history of the Civil War. There are 753 Civil War veterans buried in Mercer County as well as nine confederate soldiers. Later she discovered records of 16 veterans from the Spanish American War and 61 veterans from World War 1, which at that time was called the Great War. This is where the Mercer County records seemed to end because continued accounting of the Veteran burials in Mercer County did not seem to be organized. Her further research then started with a monument at the Mercer County Courthouse that lists veterans who were killed in action during the recent wars of World War I, World War II, the Korean War, and the Vitetnam War. According to the inscribed monument, there were 12 veterans from WWI, 75 from WWII, 8 from Korea, and 15 from Vietnam listed on the monument. Lois has not learned what criteria was used to identify these veterans when the monument was erected, however, this is not to say that other veterans served during these wars but survived the war and passed away in later years.

Rock Island

On Saturday, October 14th, Rock Island County HCE celebrated a combined Cultural Arts and International Day. We celebrated Egypt, our country of study this year. Our table centerpieces were tall papyrus plants and three pyramids made our of decorated paper stamped with the Egyptian letters HCE. The meal was an authentic Egyptian meal: Hala Cart Chicken, Koshary, yellow rice with white sauce, and Pita bread, Naan bread, a veggie tray with hummus, Pita chips with hummus, stuffed dates, and Egyptian cookies and candies.

Our special speaker was Brian Alm, member of the Oreintal Institute, University of Chicago. He spoke on "The Experience of Egypt" from ancient times to modern time. Mr. Alm is a scholar of ancient Egypt and an experienced traveler in the Middle East. We had many beautiful craft items on display and we voted on the ones to be sent to the state for next year's conference. Even though it was a rainy day, we had a wonderful time together.

Stephenson

This year the Stephenson County Fair ran from July 25-29 at the fairgrounds in Freeport. Stephenson County HCE had a designated area in the home economics building where we could display information on our organization and give demonstrations on everything from cooking to crafts. Some of the programs offered were small appliance demonstrations, make-and-take tootsie pop bunnies, rock painting, fresh flower arranging, and origami (paper folding). Then on Thursday, August 10, seven Stephenson County HCE members headed down to Mt. Carroll to attend the District 1 meeting at the Mt. Carroll Church of God.

On Thursday, September 7, Stephenson County hosted a multi-county (Carroll, Jo Daviess, Stephenson, Winnebago) meeting at the Farm Bureau in Freeport. 
