

CONFERENCE BEGINS TUESDAY, MARCH 11, 2025





CONFERENCE REGISTRATION: A registration fee of \$225.00 will cover the full 3-day conference which includes three lunches, two dinners and your share shops. A complimentary continental breakfast will be available in the conference center. The Full Day (Tuesday OR Wednesday) Package, includes registration, lunch, share shops, and dinner at a cost of \$150.00; the Daytime (Tuesday or Wednesday) Package includes lunch and share shops for \$125.00; Elsie Mies Banquet ONLY will be \$75.00. You <u>must be registered</u> to attend any share shop and meals. This registration information is also on the website at: www.iahce.org

<u>REGISTRATION DEADLINE</u>: You must mail your completed registration form postmarked by <u>January 31, 2025</u>, to Melissa Chitwood, 1408 East 2250 North Road, White Heath, IL 61884. You may register at conference but you may risk not being able to attend the share shop of your choice and/or meals may be different.

LATE REGISTRATION: There will be an additional \$15.00 charge per person purchasing the 3-day package and \$10.00 charge for a one-day package if registration is postmarked after the deadline of **January 31, 2025**.

REFUNDS: Registration is transferable, not refundable.

<u>WALK-IN REGISTRANTS</u>: Walk-ins must register upon arrival, pay fees, including the <u>late</u> registration fee and select an available share shop. Since some share shops are limited, walk-ins run the risk of a desired class being full and/or lack of handouts being available. Pre-registration is advised.

<u>CONFERENCE REGISTRATION</u>: 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Monday, March 10, 7:45 a.m. to 10:15 a.m. Tuesday, March 11, and 7:30 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. Wednesday, March 12. A President or designated person should register and pick up packets for ALL attendees from that county.

Thursday's featured speaker: Deanne Frieders, "This Farm Girl Cooks"

Deanne grew up in a small town in northern Illinois with a cornfield at the end of her street, but paid NO attention to the agriculture around her. She was NOT a farm girl, but she fell in love with a farmer and moved out of the suburbs and onto his farm just a few miles from where she grew up. As a new farm wife, fueled by her lifelong love of cooking – she took her first community college cooking class at age 8 and often baked miniature pies with her mom – Frieders surfed the internet for portable "field meals" but didn't find much. Experimenting in her own kitchen led to a lot of trial and error, but she eventually figured it out.

When Frieders shared a few photos of her concoctions on social media, strangers asked for the recipes. This Farm Girl Cooks entered the world in 2016. "It was me being excited about figuring out what worked for our family," she says, "and wanting to share that with other people."

To Frieders' surprise, the first response to her blog came from a woman in West Virginia who gushed about how the post had inspired her to cook again. As the emails poured in, she realized that other farm wives were looking for easy, nutritious recipes too. Today, Frieders boasts nearly 10,000 Facebook followers – plus another 2,000 on Instagram – and gets 100,000 visits a month to her website. Check out her Facebook and website!

Deanne has published two cookbooks, "Table to Tailgate," in 2020 and "Meals in Motion: Quick And Easy Recipes For Families On The Go," this past August. She will have copies of her new cookbook available to purchase and autograph at the conference.
