2nd VICE PRESIDENT – Mary Johnson





Please fill out the registration form accurately and completely, and don't forget to include a self-addressed, stamped envelope. I will send a tag for each item back to you sometime around the middle of February. Brint the tags along with the items you are entering. These tags will be attached securely to the items when you check in at the show.

If you prefer, you may register your items by email. Fill out the form (page 28 in the Guidebook) scan it and email it to me, beckybelcher75@gmail.com by January 31st. I will send a confirmation email as soon as I receive your registration. If you don't get the confirmation email with 24 hours, please resend or call me. I will send your tags by email (around mid-February), which you ust then print and bring with your entries as instructed above.

Please note the following clarification to the size rule: the items must be no larger than 25 inches wide by 24 inches long. The height may be higher than 24 inches, within reason. The item must be able to be displayed on a table.

Reminders: The County Summaries are to be postmarked (emailed hours must be sent by midnight) by January 5th, 2025, to be eligible for State Awards. If I can't read the members' name, it possibly will be misspelled on a certificate, therefore I must replace that certificate. Reports that emailed, please send the report as an attachment, if you send as the body of the email, the report does not print out correctly.

Also, this year we are offering you to be able to order your conference tote bag and conference T-shirt early. The tote bag will be \$25.00, and the T-shirt is \$20.00 for all sizes. So, get your orders in for the IAHCE 101st memorabilia, the lapel pin will be for sale at the sales table in March for \$6.00. 
Seasons Greeting from Jo Daviess County.

Mercer

Mercer County had a board meeting in August, 2024. Plans were made for a presentation in October to celebrate HCE Week, and plans were also discussed for the annual meeting. Mercer County's program for HCE week was handled by Cara Ausmus, Mercer County president, and Dr. Carol Longley, Health professor with Western Illinois University. Cara gave a short program featuring the country of Malaysia, our



country of study for 2025. Malaysia is a small country with a large population of 35, 682,000.. The capital alone, Kuala Lumpur, has a population of 8, 816,000. Cara emphasized the fabric industry of this country. Many visitors to Malaysia will seek the fabrics that are manufactured here. Cara, herself, enjoyed shopping for these amazing fabrics that may

be available in shops along the shopping midway or maybe in a larger venue. These fabrics can be quite exquisite and sought after by many people across the world.

Carol Longley was our other presenter. Carol's expertise is nutrition. This is to say that she is well qualified with a PhD in Nutrition. Her program detailed the necessary steps in food preparation from raw food, to cooking the dish, and for a meal, to serving the food to family or a large crowd. Yes, most cooks know the safety rules involving various foods being prepared at the same time. However, being reminded of these rules is not an insult but a gentle nudge to draw on our memories.

Carole stressed that all foods:: produce or meat or dairy have three enemies of contamination. They are bacteria, viruses, and fungi. Any one of these pose a serious health risk if not treated with care and proper sanitation or preparation. Just to show how quickly bacteria can multiply, Carol asked Cara to take this piece of paper and pretend that it is bacteria. She asked Cara to begin tearing the paper into halves, quarters, and just keep tearing the paper into small and smaller and smaller bits. Of course this was to emphasize how quickly bacteria can multiply and spoil the foods that we prepare and eat. After forty-five minutes, Cara didn't have any paper left to tear! In the meanwhile Carol was giving us rules of preparation;

- A. Wash your hands before you begin any food prep.
- B. Have a separate cutting area or board or mat when working with one ingredient to another.
- C. Be sure to have a reliable thermometer to check the internal temperatures of foods.
- D. Cook and bake all foods to proper internal temperature.

E. Lastly, gathering all foods to store as leftovers while taking into consideration the amount of time it may sit on a table after the meal is finished.

Carol finishes by, telling us these rules of preparation will help all cooks avoid foodborne illnesses as contamination is kept at a minimum.





Rock Island

Rock Island County had three board members attend the District I Meeting in Seneca. Information they received was shared with the other board members at our August meeting and with unit chairmen at the Leadership Update. Unit chairmen were also given job descriptions for the unit officers to help them better understand their responsibilities within their unit. October 12th was our annual Cultural Arts Day combined with International Day. Our program was on the Country of Study, Maylasia, and food native to the country was served. The top three winners of the crafts entered were, first place went to Ida Kerr, Cordova Unit, on her "3D Quilt". Second Place was a tie going to Mary McCarthy, Cordova Unit on her "Sweatshirt Jacket" and Elaine Brown, Riverdale Unit, on her quilted table runner. GREETINGS FROM STEPHENSON COUNTY!

The 170th Stephenson County Fair was held on July 23-27 at the fairgrounds in Freeport. Once again, Stephenson County HCE had a designated area in the Home Economics Building where we could display and hand out information on our organization. As the area was large enough, we were able to present programs and workshops. This year we had everything from freeze drying your food to raising honey bees to bow making. There was a hands-on session where you could creatively decorate (and then eat) a cupcake which had been baked in an ice cream cone. Fairgoers of all ages—little kids to retirees—stopped by to decorate cupcakes. We also had a demonstration on making flowers out of plastic bottle bottoms (popular with the younger set)I In one area, we had a card table set up with crayons and pictures so kids could take a break, relax, and just sit and color.



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
