New Cookbook Contains Favorite Recipes of Illinois 4-H

Many 4-H members remember making snickerdoodles, wheat bread, funny cake, and brownies when learning food skills as part of their 4-H project work. Over the years, the memories remained, but the recipes were lost. A new cookbook, <u>Favorite Recipes of Illinois 4-H</u> <u>Through the Years</u> includes all of the most requested recipes from the past 60 years and is available from the Illinois 4-H Foundation.

"Fairly often I hear from a former 4-H'er who is looking for a lost recipe," said Jananne Finck, University of Illinois Extension educator for nutrition and wellness in Springfield and a member of the fundraising committee for the cookbook. "Anyone who took a foods project in 4-H will enjoy this book. It is a delight to see them organized and contained in one publication."

More than 150 recipes from 4-H foods project books such as You Learn to Bake, ABC's of Food, Adventures in Cooking, It's Fun to Cook, Milk and Eggs, Meat in Your Meals, Pastry in Your Meals, and Yeast Breads in Your Meals are included in this 8/12 x 11' spiral bound cookbook. Recipes are listed by book, alphabetically, and by food category for easy reference. The cookbook costs \$15.00 plus shipping. It can be ordered online at <u>www.4hfoundation.illinois.edu</u> or by completing an order form available from the local Extension office. Bundles of 10 cookbooks are also available for a slight discount.

The cookbook allows you to walk down memory lane and can also help teach youth. Illustrations from the *Pastry in Your Meals* book are included to show the different steps to make a pie crust. Also included are illustrations from the *Yeast Breads in Your Meals* book, which show how to knead bread and form different kinds of rolls.

Proceeds from the cookbook will be used to support current 4-H foods project resources and training for 4-H volunteers. "We think the cookbook is a wonderful way to reconnect with 4-H alumni. As part of this project we're collecting stories from former 4-H members to become part of the Illinois 4-H history," states Illinois 4-H Foundation Director Angie Barnard. *Favorite Recipes of Illinois 4-H Through the Years...* would make a perfect Mother's Day, Graduation, birthday, or other special occasion gift for mothers, daughters, sons, grandmothers, 4-H leaders, or 4-H alums. During our first meeting that was held at the DoubleTree Hotel and Convention Center in Bloomington (the 2010 site for our 86th Annual Conference) the board members met in the suite of President Marilyn Daughhetee where tables were set up for the 17 board members eliminating paying for an extra room for our meetings. With board members coming in from all over the state, the Executive Committee (President, 1st and 2nd Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer) met before the rest of the board arrived.

President Marilyn Daughhetee surprised us when she prepared a catered meal for the cost of the food for our evening dinner. We had our choice of two different meat for sandwiches with the fixings, fruit, home baked cookies and beverages. Jane Chapman surprised us with fresh strawberries from her garden and were they every good! This saved the state money since it does cost to feed 17 board members. What was nice, we also was able to use it for our lunch on Monday.

After our dinner on Sunday evening, the rest of the committees began to meet. During these meetings, much was discussed and accomplished. The Public Relations and the District Workshop committees met. Monday morning the Membership, Support Fund, Education and By-Laws and Standing Rules committees met. After our lunch (what was left from the night before), the International Exchange and Leadership committees met. After a break, the full Board met with Susan Taylor, U of I Liaison reporting and giving us some sound information on how it takes more than one person but a committee of several to make good decisions for the organization.

After dinner, three more committees met, the International Projects, Annual Conference Chairs and the Budget committee.

After a good nights sleep we began again. Tuesday morning the last of the committees met before the Full Board. They were Nominating and Scholarship committees.

YOUR IAHCE BOARD AT WORK.....

Midmorning, we all gathered together to report on what each committee discussed and needed motions on. Some of the information coming from these committees include:

- Public Relations The state website is up and running. Discussion on what needs to be on the site in the future was discussed. Definitely the Gray Guidebook but there are several places that need updating and after that is done, pages will begin to be uploaded to the site. Note that the newsletter is paying for itself.
- Membership The biggest job for them is that they are rewriting/redoing the "County of the Year" application form.
- Education Directors One of the things they are working on is to streamline and improve the "Awards Banquet" presentations of the awards. They read the evaluations and that was where we needed improving. All award applications will be due January 31 and the guidebook will be amended.

By-Laws and Standing Rules - Several changes are suggested here and the changes should be in each of the counties President packets that they receive in December. Some changes are needed to update the By -Laws and there are changes in the Gray Guidebook such as dates or clarifications.

- As stated before, the application form for "County of the Year" is being revised.
- Annual Conference After looking at the evaluations, it was decided that the IAHCE Chorus sing during the Wednesday lunch (after you've eaten) rather than during the business meeting on Wednesday morning. That will cut the cost of paid entertainment and the Chorus are a lovely group of our members who have entertained us each year with songs that fit our theme of the conference.
- Nominating ~ Information on what offices that will be up for election will be in your Workshop Packets in August and who to contact with names of interested members to fill these positions.
- Scholarship Five young people were selected from the applications sent in to receive IAHCE scholarships of \$500 each. They are listed in this newsletter with their information and county.

It was a full schedule and everyone worked hard. President Marilyn Daughhetee was able to save additional monies by picking up large envelops in bulk for each Education Director to put their Workshop information in for each county (over 80 plus one each for the State Board Directors which is almost 100 envelopes each) and bulk computer paper for Board members so that the cost is much less than buying in smaller quantities. So as you can see, we are working hard to keep our organization on top of things and be much more organized and save money too!

We'll see you all at the August District Workshops with training to help you in your position that you hold in your county!

The new location is adjacent to Progress City, site of the Farm Progress Show in 2009 and subsequent odd number years.

- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 cup almonds, finely chopped
- 1 cup butter
- 2 3/4 cups sifted cake flour
- 11/3 cups milk
- 6 egg whites, stiffly beaten

White Frosting:

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
- 2 egg whites
- 1/3 cup water
- 1 dash of salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1. Cream together sugar, butter and vanilla extract.
- 2. Stir together the cake flour and baking powder; add to creamed mixture alternately with milk. Stir in almonds. Gently fold in the egg whites. Pour into two greased and lightly floured 9 inch round cake pans. Bake @ 375° for 28-30 minutes. COOL10

minutes; remove from pans. Fill and frost with the white frosting.

- 3. WHITE FROSTING: In a saucepan, combine sugar, water, cream of tartar and salt. Bring mixture to boiling; stirring until the sugar dissolves.
- 4. In a mixing bowl, place egg whites; very slowly pour the hot sugar syrup over, beating constantly with mixer until stiff peaks form, about 7 minutes. Beat in vanilla.
