The IAHCE June Board Meeting in Decatur, IL was busy and productive. I went away with "homework". I have a research project for the next Board

Meeting and final preparations for the August District Workshops. (I like homework with research and creative elements.) But, most of all I went away with the feeling that the State Board and County Boards in our IAHCE organization are working to move the organization forward while learning from and honoring the past.

Again this year, your contributions to Pennies for Friendship made it possible for IAHCE to donate monies to three youth oriented programs and an organization celebrating international friendship and peace. These donations are from the15% of *Pennies for Friendship* monies retained by IAHCE. Donations were given to the *Illinois 4-H Foundation, International Four-H Youth Exchange (IFYE), Labo program (family- based Japanese youth organization) and the International Peace Garden.*  The IFYE program sent a 4-H'er from Livingston County to Japan for 8 weeks and a 4-H'er from Winnebago County to Finland for 4 weeks this Summer. Also, this Summer 46 Japanese youth and their 4 chaperones from the Labo organization enjoyed a month homestay experience in Illinois.

The International Peace Garden straddling the border of North Dakota and Manitoba is a 2,339 acre botanical garden with camping sites, Summer Camps that encourage cultural arts and athletics for young people, and more features. This is definitely a road trip destination. Did you know Pennies for Friendship was launched in 1936 as the Million Member Fund? Shortly thereafter it was dubbed 'Pennies for Friendship' by the USA. Illinois participated in this from the beginning.

I trust your study of South Africa or any other country your county has selected this year is going well. These days I experience South African information and connections often. For 3 ½ weeks this Summer 7 high-school age South African 4-H members came to Illinois to participate in the 4-H Youth Leadership Program. Academic sessions, leadership training, host family living, 4-H club meetings and 4-H camp were all on the itinerary.

I look forward to meeting and sharing information with IAHCE members in the counties at the District Workshops in August. I've prepared a South African lesson on a CD for all counties to use. I'll also give tips on completing the Report/Educational Award Form and the Mini-Stipend Form. Hello! I hope all of you have been enjoying your summer. We've had nice weather so

far, and I've been taking advantage by doing many outdoor activities, including camping, fishing, golfing and gardening. But I'm especially excited for our first tomato out of the garden and am geared up and ready to preserve! University of Illinois Extension will once again be offering food preservation courses. Coming soon, we will have online food preservation training so that you can learn all about food preservation no matter where you are located! Those that take the training will also be eligible to receive hands-on canning workshops held in various locations throughout the state. Plus, we will be testing pressure canner gauges in the class, "Yes! You Can: Preserving Safely." Call your local Extension office for more information.

Also, University of Illinois Extension has a lot of new and exciting HCE lessons that will be starting this August. They include, "Managing a Gluten Free Diet" and "Cooking with Fresh Garden Vegetables" from the Nutrition and Wellness team, "Preparing for a Nursing Home Visit" and "Parenting 101" from the Family Life team, and "Finance Tips for Retirees in Today's Economy" from the Consumer Economic team. If your county hasn't already registered for lessons, contact your local Extension office to have them register for you. Registration and lessons will continue until December 2014. Then, starting in January 2014 we will begin new lessons and continue these through the calendar year.

I know that the summer does not stop you from volunteering your time. Many of you are actively involved in the 4-H fairs, and University of Illinois Extension thanks you for that! #### **ACWW REPORT**

Lake County took a walk around the "Globe" during their Annual Meeting and collected Pennies for Friendship. ACWW's Women Walk the World annual event is an opportunity to promote friendship and international solidarity, a healthy activity, and an opportunity for publicity and raising funds for ACWW and/or any non-profit organization focusing on people. **If your county participated in Women Walk the World, please let me know, so I can acknowledge your efforts.** 

The United Nations designated 2013 as the International Year of Water, ACWW has a long standing Water for All project fund, NVON member states have a Water Around the World project in common for 2013-2015. Water is a precious resource and basic necessity of life. I believe access to clean and safe water for every human is a right to be achieved. For many people in the world, water is in short supply. Let's keep less water favored people in the world in mind as we enjoy our summer. You might consider how you can participate in the UN, ACWW and NVON 'water' initiatives.

The April-June 2013 CountryWoman newsletter has an article "Water, Water Everywhere, Only if we Share!". In the spirit of ACWW's campaign 'Grow Locally, Benefit Globally', it has valuable suggestions for conserving water in gardening. For instance less frequent watering allows plants to establish deeper root systems, watering at cooler times of day lessens evaporation, drip irrigation (like hoses with tiny holes) is water-efficient, and mulching is beneficial. Even though we live in the Great Lakes region, we all remember 2012 as a year of drought in Illinois.
