The following is Becky Markwell's President's Message of the Illinois Traffic Safety Leaders:

Paris, Lindsay, Nicole - all names very familiar to today's youth and with more in common than just being famous. All have recently been in the national news for driving under the influence. In all the media frenzy, however, what seems to be lacking in the reporting is the seriousness of the crime each of these young women committed. That crime is driving under the influence, but it seems to barely merit a mention in the midst of all the hype. I found myself wanting to applaud the TV one night when the pundit discussing Paris Hilton's incarceration did take the time to point out that: 1) her original arrest had been for something quite serious, driving under the influence; and 2) that she could have hurt or killed herself or an innocent person on the road that night. That same person remarked that the public seemed unconcerned about the original charge and that he fully expects one of these young women to be badly hurt or even killed if we don't start taking impaired driving more seriously.

I hope it doesn't take a tragedy to wake yup the popular culture, but it often seems to be the only thing that does. That's why I am so pleased to see Illinois taking the steps it is to keep our young drivers safer. We need to continue to be proactive, not reactive, about this issue. Too many young people are continuing to die on our highways as we react, rather than work proactively to stop these devastating losses.

To that end, I was privileged to be part of conducting focus groups regarding the topic of

underage drinking and driving at three Illinois colleges during the spring semester of 2007 for IDOT's Division of Traffic Safety.

Some of the findings were expected, but some were very surprising. No one in any of the three groups thought it was difficult for individuals under age 21 to obtain alcohol. Students did not clearly know or understand what the Zero Tolerance and under 21 DUI laws and penalties are in Illinois. Because of this, it appears to most of the 18-20 year old students participating did not take these laws seriously. Some students stated they definitely would not drive after drinking, while others expressed just being more cautious when driving after drinking.

Probably the most surprising (depressing) comments to me concerned the students' definition of a designated driver. To the majority of those in the groups, the designated driver was the "least drunk" person in the group. To them, the designated driver was not necessarily a sober driver, just the person who was not as drunk as the others. For those who work with young people, there is a very clear message that needs to be communicated - the designated driver needs to be completely sober, not just the least impaired.

As traffic safety advocates, we need to renew our pledge to stop underage drinking and driving. We have the alcohol industry and popular culture working against us. It seems our message is being lost in the ads clearly aimed at our youth and the celebrities who seem to glamorize the issue through the media attention their criminal behavior generates. Going to rehab seems to have become as fashionable as going to a spa used to be. We are small in number and our budgets can't compare with those of the alcohol industry and Hollywood, but we can't back down.

I just hope in a future newsletter we are not discussing the death of one of these young celebrities due to a drunk driving crash. I have been in the field for a long time and I am tired of reacting to the latest tragedy. There have been too many.

The above message is indeed sobering Keep on reaching out.

SPECIAL REPORT

REPORT FROM NVON - LEXINGTON, KY JULY 20, 2007

During this year the ACWW Projects Committee has approved monies for the following projects:

Romania: "Letters for the Street Children of Bucharest" to provide residents with access to literacy and health education to help children who have been abandoned by their families, to lead normal lives and so avoid the feeling of isolation and loneliness. ACWW fund the computers, software and books for the centre. In the women's words "the measure of success will be if at the end of the year 75% of the illiterate children can read and write.

Uganda-Water Supply for Medical Centre for pumps, pies, etc.

India - 10 boreholes installed providing drinking water for 846 families.

Swaziland bore holes drilled then pumps and tanks installed for a Primary School providing toilets and hand basins.

Sri Lanka received 6 wells in 6 communities and 10 latrines and tanks.

Ghana-Irrigation Development Project

Kenya construction of tanks to lessen time the women needed getting water from Lake Victoria - 4 hours.

Funding for HIV/Aids Prevention and Education Project for a Disabled Women's Association in Uganda, Ghana and Cameroon. Kenya - Malaria control project produces 30 affordable mosquito nets a day for sale. Project participants are trained in production of nets, animal health care, primary health care and education in prevention of malaria.

A project monitored by Mercy was a Tailoring Project with aims to weave clothes from cotton and to use machines to make garments.

Tanzania Project was Nutrition and Catering to give women the knowledge, skills and equipment to enable them to run their own business successfully.

Romania - Funding for Equipping the Resource and Training Centre in Targu for disadvantaged women.

China - Piggery Project and Cataract Operations

India - Sheep rearing/ Nutrition Education training.

Korea - Vocational Training for Handicapped women.

Uganda - Beekeeping and another to sensitize communities to the dangers of Female Genital Mutilation.

Papua-New Guinea - Adult Literacy Teachers Training plus "Training the Teachers".

Peru - Micro-Credit Revolving Loan Program and Jewelry using Recycled Forest Products.

Bangladesh - Breast Screening

Cameroon - Food Sustainability thru Plantains and Pepper Production.

MEMORIAL

Rose Keith 1915-2007

Rose Keith, 92 of Canton died October 17, 2007. She was born July 9, 1915 in Laurium, Mich. She was married to Anthony Helle in 1938. He died in 1965. Rose married George Keith in 1968. Both Rose and



George were involved with IHEF. In 1976 they were awarded first place for overall excellence in Public Information for their slide presentation and dialogue "Movin' On". In LaSalle county they started a unit called NEHC Couples Club which was organized to make future meetings attractive to men attending.

Rose was very active in our organization, whether it was IHEF or IHEA or IAHCA. Rose was the State Treasurer from 1975-1978 and was our President during 1982-1985. She attended several ACWW conferences, one in Vancouver, Canada. She served on CWC conference committees. In 1984, she gave the first check of \$11,000 to Dr. O'Reilly, Assistant of the Cooperative Extension service for the Support Fund. She was active in Fulton County and LaSalle County.

RECIPES FROM GREECE


BAKLAVA

from Lee Beals

4 Cups finely chopped Walnuts

1/2 Cup Sugar

- l teaspoon ground Cinnamon
- 16 Ounce package Phyllo Dough (in freezer section) Thaw by removing from freezer to the refrigerator the day before.
- 1 Cup melted Butter





Instructions:

- 1. Grease with butter a 9"~X~1~1" baking dish or pan.
- 2. In a large bowl, mix nuts, sugar and cinnamon.
- Cut Phyllo dough to fit baking dish. (May not need to do this.
- 4. Place a sheet of Phyllo dough in bottom of pan. Brush thoroughly with melted butter. (Do not skimp on butter-it holds the Phyllo dough together) Repeat to make 6 layers of dough and butter. Sprinkle 1/3 of walnut mixture. Add a sheet of Phyllo, brush with butter. Repeat this 4-5 times (Phyllo and butter). Add 1/3 of walnut mixture. Do another 5-6 layers of Phyllo and butter; then a last layer of walnut mixture. Use remaining Phyllo to make the top layers. Each brushed with butter.
- 5. With a sharp knife, cut just halfway through the layers in a diamond shape. (Cut diagonally one way, then the other way.) Bake in a 300° oven 1 hour and 25 minutes or until golden brown. (Watch it closely-might be less time)
- 6. In a small saucepan, heat honey until hot, but not boiling. Spoon over hot baklava. Cool thoroughly. Finish cutting through the layers; Store in an airtight container.

GREEK SESAME COOKIES

from Angie Cushman

4 Eggs

1 1/2 Cup Sugar 1 Cup Oil 2 Teaspoon Vanilla, Butter, Almond, Lemon Flavorings (I used 2 tsp. each of first three and 1 tsp. of lemon) 5 Cups All Purpose Flour (maybe more) 2 1/2 Teaspoon Baking Powder Pinch of Salt Sesame Seeds

Beat eggs until light and fluffy. Add sugar and beat 5 minutes. Slowly add oil and flavorings and beat 10 minutes.

Sift all dry ingredients together and start adding to egg mixture and blend thoroughly. Knead if you have to. Let rest in refrigerator about 1/2 hour. The dough will handle better.

Pinch off a small piece of dough and roll pencil thin....about 5 inches long and 1/2 inch wide. Dip into sesame seeds and place 1/2 inch apart in either a greased pan or use parchment paper. That's what I use. Heat your oven to 350°. Bake for 15-17 minutes or as brown as you like. All ovens differ. You should know how your oven works.

If your eggs are huge, you might have to use extra flour. The dough should be stiff enough to roll. You be the judge.
